


## SINGLE STREAM RECYCLING GUIDELINES

<p style="text-align: center;">Plastic Bottles, Jugs and Containers</p> 	<p>This includes all rigid plastic containers with symbols 1-7 on the bottom.            Examples include:</p> <p>Soda and juice bottles    Salad dressing bottles    Milk jugs    Juice bottles            Detergent bottles                      Saline solution bottles    Window Cleaner            Fabric cleaner or bleach bottles    Shampoo bottles</p>	<p>Plastic shopping bags, plastic food wrap            Potato chip and sandwich bags            Styrofoam            Automotive fluid bottles (oil, antifreeze, brake fluid)</p>

## CONTAINER PREPARATION



**Make sure it is clean!**

- Does that plastic lunch container still have yesterday's pizza in it?

**Do not recycle it until it is clean!**

- One dirty product or one with food waste still in it can contaminate an entire bale containing thousands of pounds of collected plastics.
- This can cause thousands of recyclable items to go to a landfill instead of being recycled.

**Cleanliness is essential.**

### Please remember

- Remove all plastic bags
- Remove any non-acceptable items
- Corrugated cardboard should be broken down
- Flatten containers whenever possible
- All containers (jars, bottles, cartons, etc.) must be rinsed and free of contaminants
- Remove and discard all corks, tops, rings, metal bottleneck wraps, and unacceptable items
